• Tips for Winter Roof Maintenance

Tip #3: Trim overhanging branches.



HOPEmatch Brings HOPE for the Holidays to Local Families in Need

any families in our local community struggle silently and go without because they do not meet the federal poverty limit but do not make enough money to fully support their family. HOPEmatch is a local nonprofit serving the Greater Charlotte area that is all about serving those who are overlooked within our community. Many families work hard to make ends meet, yet do not qualify for government financial aid. These are the people HOPEmatch is dedicated to serving through various programs that intentionally meet physical and personal needs. The mission is to provide HOPE by matching local needs with compassionate givers. HOPEmatch aims to bring lasting hope and encouragement to the unseen and underserved in our community.

The organization was founded 14 years ago by Erin Blackmore, who through her background as a Food Stamp Case Manager at DSS, noticed how hopeless families would get when they tried to work harder but instead got less support from the community. Creating a safety net of support for families going through temporary challenges became Erin's interest, and what started as an Adopt-a-Family Christmas

program has now expanded to a year-round system of care for the local families the organization serves.





Families come into the care of HOPEmatch through a nomination process where members of the community let the organization know who needs HOPE for the holidays. From there, the families that are selected are contacted and offered holiday support, serving each member of the household. Donors adopt families and shop for the gifts, then drop them off at the seasonal office in December. Volunteers inventory, wrap and package the gifts for pick up or delivery the weekend before Christmas.

Unique to HOPEmatch, the families then receive follow-up care throughout the year in the form of personal essentials support, celebration assistance for birthdays, women's support groups, back-to-school help and access to food assistance. HOPEmatch is looking to add mental health services in the future and is looking for connections to provide affordable care for the families served.

Holiday volunteer opportunities will take place between December 1-16. Opportunities to inventory gifts, wrap gifts, help with office logistics and deliver

gifts to families are available. Please visit www.HOPEmatch.org for more information and to get involved.







Tips For Visiting Elderly Relatives During The Holidays

lder care touches everyone. Elder abuse Cis rampant. And social isolation is on the rise. Caregiving at a distance can be difficult, stressful and time-consuming. And often the only time caregivers see a loved one is on a family visit, more often around a holiday.

This holiday season, be aware of your older loved one's physical and mental capacity and take notice of their environment.

Where do you start?

First use your senses. Observe with your eyes, ears, and with your senses of taste, touch and smell. Look at the house/ apartment. Is it being kept up? Is the environment unsafe, unsanitary? Track the chores you do while there as they could point to services your loved one needs. Is there anything obviously missing or new purchases? This could indicate some type of exploitation.

How can you tell if a loved one has been abused?

There are different types of abuse, some initiated by others and those of self-neglect.

Observe physical or other abuse.

Is there a new best friend around?

Emotional abuse — is a loved one being emotionally upset or agitated; being extremely withdrawn and noncommunicative? These are signs that something is up.

Is mom or dad just slowing down or is there more going on?

Has there been excessive weight gain, weight loss, decline in general hygiene? How is their strength and balance? Does it prevent them from doing things? Will they accept help? Check for dehydration or undernourishment. Are your parents eating nutritious meals regularly? Are they able to prepare meals? Are they wearing inappropriate clothes? Is their clothing inadequate? Check that they have all of their medical aids — eyeglasses, hearing aids, dentures.

Look for signs of declining memory. Are loved ones placing items in wrong places, missing appointments? Are they forgetful?

Check expiration dates on medications. Are loved ones forgetting to take medications? Can they afford their medications? Has the number of prescriptions increased significantly?

Signs of Financial Stress

Unopened mail could indicate memory problems, vision problems or hint at financial problems. Sweepstakes circulars could indicate they or someone is responding to offers. Are there overdue bills? Are bill collectors calling or showing up at the house?

Check for any changes in the loved ones bank account. Check for any additional names on a bank signature card. Check their bank statements. Is there unauthorized withdrawal of funds?

What Do I Do If They Need Care?

First, there is a delicate art on how to communicate with an elder loved one. You want to enjoy the time you have with them and ease into the conversation. Gather information on community services that can meet their needs.

Schedule a visit with your elder's physician. Identify a social support system such as friends, neighbors, clergy and others in regular contact.

Enjoy your time with an elderly parent, relative or friend this season but be watchful of their needs. They will not let on or ask for help. So be a good observer, listener and friend.



Give Yourself the

Gift of Organization this Holiday Season

ne thing you notice right away moving to or living in the South is the lack of storage space. Most homes here do not have basements, and storage seems to be an afterthought or not well thought out, with odd, short under-the-stair closets or little rooms with doors under the eaves. The Mooresville **Public Library**

here is a building in Mooresville where you can follow a rabbit down a hole to meet a queen; or walk through a looking glass to play a game of chess; sail straight ahead to the second star on the right and lock swords with a pirate who has a hook for a hand; or open a wardrobe door to follow a faun to a lamppost in the woods; take a wild ride with a toad in his car; or meet a nanny who can pop in through paintings in the sidewalk—all in the most supercalifragilistic expialidocious building in the town. What is this building you ask? Why, it is the library of course, and this one has a unique history all its own.

The Mooresville Public Library was started in the late 1870s by a group of citizens who gave books to what was then called the Lending Library. This was a subscription-based library where people had to pay to be members to rent the books. The books were stamped with the rental cost (typically a nickel at that time). By the 1880s the library had grown and had moved above a store on Main Street. By the 1890s it had grown in popularity, and by 1899 the Town Board of Commissioners hired the first librarian and changed the library from a lending library to a free library.


The library then moved into a new home above Miller Drug Store where it stayed until about 1910, when the first Town Hall was built, and the library moved into a room on the second floor of the new building. With a larger space, the library added more books to its collection and the first library board was formed to be the governing body for the library. By the late 1920s space was needed in Town Hall for other departments and the library had to move once again, this time to a space above another store on Main Street. By the 1930s the library had grown in popularity and was desperately in need of a home to call its own. In 1939 Mrs. LuTelle Sherrill Williams came to the rescue.

An avid book lover/reader, Mrs. Williams felt it was time for the library to have a new and permanent home. Married to Clay Williams, who was at the time president of R. J. Reynolds, Mrs. Williams and her husband lived in Winston-Salem, leaving her home on Main Street vacant. With help from her husband and R. J. Reynolds, she razed her house and built a library building on the site. The new library was the first fireproof building in town, with the walls made of brick, steel and concrete with a steel and concrete roof topped with slate shingles. The building was state of the art at the time, with central heat, electric lighting and elegant architectural work and wood shelves. The delivery of the shelves was delayed, as the company had to cut the trees first, but the new library finally opened in December of 1939.

In 1964 a children's room was added to the building and the basement was expanded. Over the years the library continued to grow and by 2000, the library had grown to the point that a new building was needed. In 2003 the Friends of the Library began a fundraising campaign and the town Board started making plans to expand the library building. With the help of patrons, the community, businesses and a generous donation from Lowe's corporation, the library expansion was completed, and in 2005 opened its new 30,000 square foot addition. The new addition included space for meeting rooms, study areas, a floor devoted to the children's library and more shelves for books.

In the fall of 2022, the library opened its first branch, located on the West side of town. Today the library continues to be a vital part of the Mooresville community and surrounding area, with both branches offering quality programs, materials and top-notch service to all who visit.

At one point, Emily, who has died, asks the Stage Manager "Do human beings ever realize life while they live it? Every, every minute?" To which he replies, "Some do. Saints and poets maybe." When we are here, now, in this present moment, not lamenting the past or fretting about the future, we can enjoy all that life has to

offer us. For me, that might be the spicy scent of ginger as I prepare a butternut squash soup. Or the feel of the wind on my cheeks as I take a walk on a late fall morning. The slant of the sun sparkling on the frosty grass. The first sip of my morning coffee. Life is made of moments that we can only fully appreciate if we are aware of what we are seeing, smelling, feeling and not rushing off into something else.

The end of the year tends to be a time of great activity. Everyone has a lengthy list of "Things That Must Get Done." And then comes New Year's and the resolution to "Slow Down. Be More Mindful. Take It Easy." Why not exercise your poetic muscles before you need to resolve to do so? Give yourself an early present of the Present moment. Take a walk, notice the way the magnolia leaves slap in the wind and how the beautiful trees sport hefty rattles with red seeds. Listen for the winter birds that still populate the sky; watch the bright red cardinals dart across the white sky and settle on leafless branches. Feel the cold air heat your cheeks, and make you glad for the cup of hot tea you might drink upon your return home. Be in the moment, not cursing the colder weather, but loving Nature for the respite, the spell of silence that accompanies this season of the year.

Make Your Own Glühwein (Mulled Spiced Wine)

Translated to "glow wine," you can enjoy this warm winter market and traditional after-skiing treat at holiday gatherings or around the firepit!

Ingredients

- 3/4 cup water
- 3/4 cup white or turbinado
- 1.3-inch cinnamon stick
- 2 medium oranges, divided
- 10 whole cloves
- 1,750 milliliter bottle of red wine

Nirections

1. Bring the water, sugar and cinnamon stick to a boil. Reduce the heat to low.

- 2. Cut an orange in half and squeeze the juice into the mixture.
- 3. Push the cloves into the outside of the orange peel. Place into the simmering mixture.
- 4. Simmer until the mixture is thick and syrupy. Remove from heat.
- 5. Stir in the wine while the mixture is hot, but not simmering.




